MESSAGE FROM THE FELLOWSHIP VICE PRESIDENT

Dear Open Circle Friends,

It was a joy, as always, to gather as a spiritual community last Sunday as we considered Christina's message on love as the foundation of right relationship and spiritual community. I understand that Christina's workshop on UU history and theology in the afternoon was wonderful and very well-attended.

Planning Retreat: In late January, we had a very productive planning retreat, beginning with a listening session and moving into more detailed discussions in the late morning and afternoon. We discussed our membership, programming, space, and staff in terms of strengthening the four pillars of our church life: spirituality, fellowship, outreach and stewardship. An executive summary of the retreat is included in this newsletter. At our March Board meeting, we will establish a number of one year and three to five year goals based on the retreat. Further information/discussions will be forthcoming. In the meantime, a few words about some key themes and topics:

Open Circle Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

One recurring theme was increasing our sense of our place as part of Unitarian Universalism. We plan to have some kind of programming around Unitarian Universalist identity each year, whether that be simple membership orientations or a more in-depth class. We also agreed to a goal of having a study group on a UUA Congregational Study and Action Issue (CSAI) each year. (See the note elsewhere in the Newsletter on **the UUA Social Witness Process**.)

UUA Certification programs: We have participated or are participating in two UUA Certification programs. We have already been certified as a Welcoming Congregation that is inclusive of people regardless of sexual orientation. We are in the process of becoming a Green Sanctuary. Through the Green Sanctuary program, a congregation pursues sustainable practices as a congregation and encourages such practices among members. A team has started the work of leading us in pursuing this certification. Recently, the McDowell's led a fruitful discussion of ideas of sustainable practices and educational efforts we might carry out.

We will also work on further ways we can emphasize our UU identity throughout our fellowship life.

Ministerial Leadership

In terms of future ministerial leadership, we did not come to any concrete conclusions but are considering moving towards part time ministerial leadership in about five years. Pastoral



to be the primary concern for most of us. Soon, student ministers will not be available through Meadville Lombard Seminary because that school will become an on-line institution, so this is a further reason we need to explore other options. For next year, we may be able to continue to work with a student minister, and we are also considering other options.

The Building Fund, The Building Fund, The Building Fund

One recurring theme—our need to pay for our building. We will need to begin paying a mortgage on July 1 of this year. Even if we achieve our Building Fund goal of meeting the Bowman's generous offer to match qualified donations up to \$75,000, we will still likely have to pay about \$1300 per month that we are not currently paying.

All Open Circle members and friends will soon be receiving a letter asking for donations to the Building fund over the coming months. Please consider making a donation that is as generous as possible given your circumstances.

In addition, since there is not much room for cutting in our budget, our monthly operating expenses will almost certainly go up as we begin to pay our mortgage. We hope that anyone who can afford it will consider increasing their pledge amount at least slightly, or if possible, substantially, beginning next year. No one likes to talk about money. But, we do need money to support the good work of the Open Circle. *(continued on page 3)*

A BRIEF EXPLANATION OF UUA SOCIAL WITNESS PROCESS

Congregational Study and Action Issues and **Statements of Conscience** are the two components of the UUA's Social Witness process. Of course, any UUA member congregation is free to work on any issue that it feels is morally important and in keeping with the UUA's Seven Principles, but the social witness process means that Congregations around the country are studying and acting on an issue, increasing the likelihood of making a broader impact.

The Unitarian Universalist Association chooses one new **Congregational Study and Action Issue (CSAI)** each year. After a few years of study and action by member congregations, interested people formulate a **Statement of Conscience (SOC)** on the issue, representing a moral stance on the issue to which the participating members can agree. Once a Statement of Conscience passes, a year of implementation follows. (Of course, congregations have often taken some kind of action on the issue earlier in the process, but congregations are encouraged to take steps to act upon the SOC.

This year's **new Congregational Study and Action issue** is **immigration as a moral issue**. After several years of study and action on the issue of **ethical eating**, a **Draft Statement of Conscience** on that issue is currently under discussion. The Eco Food group has led us in study of this issue, and Eco-Food member Jane Dennis led an interesting discussion of the draft at our most recent potluck breakfast.

Finally, at least year's General Assembly, **the UUA passed a Statement of Conscience on Peacemaking**. Open Circle discussed the draft and voted to support the Statement's passage. This year is considered a 'year of implementation' of this Statement of Conscience. Open Circle has had several Sunday programs focused on peacemaking. We are also working to create a culture of peace within our fellowship by beginning work on a healthy congregation process where we discuss how we will communicate and interact to ensure that we live out our mission to truly be a beloved community.

If you feel you have found a spiritual home in the Open Circle, but have not yet joined OCUUF, we hope you will consider signing the membership book. Signing the membership book means that you feel you have found a spiritual home here and that you are committing to support the Open Circle Fellowship financially and with your time and talents. CHALICE SIGN WELCOMES ALL TO OPEN CIRCLE UU FELLOWSHIP

A beautiful stained glass chalice sign was installed last summer in the front window of Open Circle Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, 19 E. Third Street. The stained glass piece features the flaming chalice, symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith, placed within a large open circle. The stained glass is framed in golden oak bearing the name "Open Circle Unitarian Universalist Fellowship." It identifies our Fellowship and extends an invitation to enter.

The creation of the chalice sign was the work of several Open Circle members. It was designed by Dean Malloy, and crafted by Howie Woodworth-Zanto, gifted stained glass artist and owner of Living Light Studio. Tom Schuppe had the vision and drive to bring together Dean's idea and Howie's skill.

In creating their symbol Unitarian Universalists utilized two images, the chalice (footed cup) and flame, which have held religious meaning across centuries and faith traditions. Chalices can be found worldwide on ancient manuscripts and altars. In the Judeo Christian tradition the chalice used by Jesus at his last Passover Seder became the Holy Grail sought by the knights of Wales and England. Sharing, generosity, sustenance, and love are meanings symbolized by the chalice.

As a sacrificial fire, flame has been a central symbol in the world's oldest scriptures, the Vedic hymns of India. Pagan and earth based religions also utilize the symbol of flame and fire. Both the burning bush encountered by Moses in the wilderness and the flaming tongues of Pentecost are examples of the flame bearing witness to a message from God in the Judeo Christian faiths. Eternal flames stand watch at monuments and tombs and candles flicker in cathedrals, temples, mosques, and meeting houses around the globe. A flame can symbolize witness, spirit, sacrifice, courage, and illumination.

The chalice and flame were brought together as a Unitarian symbol by Austrian artist, Hans Deutsch in 1941 for use by the Unitarian Service Committee in its work assisting refugees (Jews, Unitarians, and others) escaping the Nazis. Dan Hotchkiss writes that the Unitarian Service Committee was operating in a "cloak and dagger world, where establishing trust quickly across barriers of language, nationality, and faith could mean the difference between life and death." The flaming chalice was made into a seal for papers and a badge for agents moving refugees to freedom and has become the symbol of Unitarian Universalism.

OPEN CIRCLE U. U. FELLOWSHIP BOARD PLANNING WORKSHOP – JANUARY 22, 2011 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Listening Session. We began with a Listening Session in which members of the fellowship shared their vision and concerns for “Where we want to be in 5 to 10 years.” Many things were suggested, including a minister, music, better articulated structure, more social justice work, more membership activities, covenant groups, and much more.

Guiding Principles for discussion called attention to Fellowship, Outreach, Spirituality, and Stewardship throughout the discussion.

Discussion Organization. Following the opening session, the Board and Committee representatives had discussion around four topic areas: Our Space (the building/facility), Our Membership (the people who come together), Our Program (what we offer), and Our Staff (the people who are paid to work for us).

Major Themes. Major themes that emerged from the day-long discussion include:

Building Fund. As of July 2011, Open Circle will secure a mortgage on our building. Currently, we are not paying for the building. We have established a goal of raising \$75,000 by June 1, 2011. Additionally, we have a dollar-for-dollar match on building fund contributions up to \$75,000. The more we raise now, the smaller our mortgage will be. Unfortunately, we are a long way from raising the \$75,000. We have not put enough emphasis on raising money for the building fund.

Space. We have space for about 130 chairs for worship. If we expand, we could add a second service. This building should meet our needs for the next 5 to 10 years, with growth.

Religious Education (RE). We have split responsibility for RE – Children and Youth being the responsibility of the RE Committee; Adult RE not their responsibility. The RE Committee is now searching for a new Director of RE (DRE) for next service year.

Minister. It is a goal to have a more permanent arrangement with a minister in about 5 years. This may be a part time role; the minister may be shared with another congregation. There was concern about pastoral and spiritual needs beyond the Sunday gathering.

Congregation Development. We are transitioning from a Family-size (up to 50 members) to a Pastoral-size (50 to 150 members) congregation. As we transition, we need to add more formal structures and processes to support our organization. It is the Pastoral-size where there may be enough people to financially support a regular minister. Based on the experience of other congregations (e.g., Prairie Lakes), we still need to do much work before we will be ready to call a minister. This includes better understanding our processes and procedures, our roles and responsibilities, and having those things documented so that we understand how we will relate to a minister and what to expect from that person.

Programs. Are we meeting the needs of our members? Although worship services and RE for our youth are important, there is much more in a faith community that needs to be supported. This includes social needs and activities, adult RE and much more. The number and diversity of our programs is growing, but more needs to be done. One goal we can take on is to commit to a study group each year to consider a new UUA Congregational Study and Action Issue.

I had the good fortune to attend Winter Woman Spirit 2011 in Elkhart, Indiana at the end of February. Before I launch into all the wonderful experiences I had at this conference, I would like to take a moment thank the OCUUF board for helping with both financial and emotional assistance for this unforgettable experience.

It was a lot of firsts for me. My first time driving out of state by myself, my first time staying in a hotel by myself, my first time trying to figure out tolls, and ultimately the first spiritual conference I've ever attended. What a gift!

The keynote speaker was Margot Adler, a woman who in my opinion manages to encompass appearing completely normal and extraordinary all in the same breath. She is most known for her book, *Drawing Down the Moon*, which has undergone several revisions, that gives a comprehensive and well-researched view of paganism and neo-paganism. After a rousing address and ritual, which did involve chanting, we were sent back to our hotels and homes that first night.

The next day, we perused the spiritual wares of several vendors, met lots of wonderful, strong and spiritual women, participated in two seminars of our choosing, ate a wonderful lunch and supper, capped it all off with a closing ritual (again involving about an hour of chanting!), and a "coffee house" in which some performed their creative talents.

I learned about creating sacred circles, finding my voice in writing, and learned countless other lessons which were not necessarily intended but were taught nonetheless.

I managed to make a few friends I will keep in contact with and met plenty others I didn't have the time to get to know better but may some day in the future. I learned about the great variety of paganism that existed just in this group of about 100 women and was amazed at how accepting each person was about the differences. Most participants were UUs and pagans, though not all.

I feel like this conference was an amazing gift and helped me in a few things that I haven't discussed in this article but would be happy to share in conversation....
